

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

The University and the Faculty of Law

The Faculty of Law

In 1457, Albrecht VI (Albert VI) of Austria founded the University of Freiburg, where from the very beginning theology, law, medicine, and "artes liberals" were taught. The purpose was to provide academic education in the Breisgau region. After Vienna, Freiburg was the second Habsburg university to be founded. In 1805, Freiburg became part of Baden and after that, the Grand Duke Ludwig of Baden



ensured the University's continuing existence in 1818. To thank him for this, the University's name was changed from the Albertina to the Albert-Ludwigs University of Freiburg.

In the 1880s, there was enormous economic development and with that, the number of students at the law faculty grew immensely. Freiburg attracted law students in large numbers from Berlin and northern Germany. Since 28 February 1900, women could also study at all faculties in the Grand Duchy of Baden. At the end of the 19th century, it was decided to build the main building (Kollegiengebäude I) right in the city centre and not to build an outsourced campus university. Together with the Kollegiengebäude IV and the university library, the university buildings remained in the city centre of the rapidly growing city.

In the beginning of the 16th century, *Ulrich Zasius* (1461-1535, since 1505 professor at the university), one of the most famous jurists at that time, was part of the Judicial Faculty (today Faculty of Law). Zasius drafted out the "New Town Ordinances" for Freiburg, which was passed by the Council of Freiburg in 1520. It was known as one of the most successful city laws in the first half of the 16th century, although it included several time-bound deficits (exclusion of Jews from juridical testimony, prohibition of trade with and accommodation of Jews).

The professors of the Faculty of Law in Freiburg played a special role at the time of the *Pre-March (Vormärz)* around 1848: The "*Staatslexikon*" of the "political professors" *Karl von Rotteck*

(1775-1840) and *Karl Theodor Welcker* (1790-1869) became the catechism of the liberal constitutional movement.

Between 1933 and 1935, the Nazis influenced and equalized the faculty of law and disenfranchised Jewish professors and other employees such as *Fritz Pringsheim* (1882-1967) and *Erika Sinauer* (1898-1945). Due to the cooperation of the remaining members of the faculty *Walter Eucken* (1891-1950), *Hans Großmann-Doerth* (1894-1944) and *Franz Böhm* (1895-1977), a teaching and research community made up of national economists and lawyers, known as the Freiburg School, developed. The Freiburg School contributed to the construction of the market economy after 1945 based on the concepts of Ordo-liberalism. Other members like *Erik Wolf* (1902-1977) and *Constantin von Dietze* (1891-1973) committed themselves to the fight of the "self-proclaimed church" and, as well as *Eucken* and *Böhm*, assisted the so-called Bonhoeffer Circle in the creation of a Freiburg memorandum, an important document in the resistance to National Socialism.

After a challenging phase of reconstruction and consolidation with the key figures *Fritz Pringsheim, Gustav Boehmer* (1881-1969), *Adolf Schönke* (1908-1953) and *Ernst von Caemmerer* (1908-1985), a strong expansion of the faculty took place with the creation of new departments due to the rising number of student enrolments in the 1950s.

Today, the faculty of law includes nine institutes. Their activity allows the faculty to offer a wide and current offer of studies, which covers the whole spectrum of the applicable law in the area of civil law, criminal law and public law as well as the historic and philosophic backgrounds. Due to this diversity of studies, it is possible to accommodate the students' diverse objectives and preferences, especially during their specialized major studies.

Faculty Structure

The institutional structure of the faculty results from the existence of institutes (previously known as *seminars*). Since all of them are library facilities, they were united in 1975 under the (central-) library of law, which emerged from the juridical seminar founded in 1889.

The oldest specialized institute, the Institute for the History of Law and Historical Comparative Law, was founded by *Pringsheim* and *Claudius Frhr. von Schwerin* (1880-1944) in 1929. It includes a Roman and German department, as well as an office for Greek law, which was established later by *Hans Julius Wolff* (1902-1983).

The area of civil law is covered by the Institute of Foreign and International Private Law, the Institute for German and Foreign Civil Procedure Law and the Institute for Commercial, Labour and Social Law.

Criminal law is represented by the Institute for Criminal Law and Criminal Law Proceedings, which finds its roots in the seminar about the penal system founded by *Erik Wolf* in 1930. The May-Planck-Institute for the Study of Crime, Security and Law emerged from the faculty and it is closely connected to the faculty until today.

The Institute for Public Law contains two departments for state law, as well as a department for each public international law, administrative law and public international law and their comparison. After all, the seminar of law philosophy and church law belongs to the circle of specialised institutes. Their library stack (and furthermore these of those departments, which are not connected to an institute) are recorded in the central catalogue of the library of law. In total, there can be found around 250.000 books at the library of law.

The names of some of the institutes already indicates the obvious focus of the research activity: the comparison of law based on the applicable law and its history. The subject of research itself strongly depends on the preferences and objectives of the individual professor. Hence, personal changes in the composition of the faculty also changes the scientific profile.¹

The City of Freiburg

Short history of the city of Freiburg



Freiburg was officially founded in 1120 A.D. when Duke Konrad II of Zähringen authorized the establishment of a marketplace at the foot of his castle on the Schlossberg Mountain. Due to this privilege, the young settlement quickly became appealing to the merchants of the Breisgau region. This contributed greatly to Freiburg's rapid growth and the emergence of infrastructure such as city walls, gates, a water system (e.g. the "Bächle"), and streets. After the last male heir of the Zähringen dynasty died in 1218, the related house of the unloved Counts of Urach followed in his fief. Final disempowerment occurred in 1368 after a battle between the citizens and the counts of Freiburg. The result was the emancipation of citizens from count rule and the

entrance into the increasingly powerful Habsburger Empire for a large fee. Consequently, Freiburg remained part of the Habsburger reign until 1805. Because of the lack of modern fortifications, it was easy for the French troops to conquer the city in 1677. This in turn led to major changes in the city's outward appearance: The suburbs, a large portion of the city wall and most of the gates of the stronghold were altered according to General Sébastien de

Vauban's plans. After the Treaty of Rijswijk in 1697, Freiburg returned to the Habsburg reign after 20 years of French occupation. After the Congress of Vienna in 1815, control of Freiburg fell to the Grand Duchy of Baden and after 450 years of the Habsburg reign, Freiburg was incorporated into Baden. The city stagnated and the medieval inner-city boundaries remained. It was not until the construction of the railroad and the beginning of the industrialization that new city districts emerged and the city grew. Under the command of the mayor Otto Winterer, Freiburg was developed into a "Pensionopolis" at the end of the 19th century: A targeted recruitment of pensioners from northern Germany at the turn of the century together with the increase in the number of students caused Freiburg to "explode", so that the population increased by almost 400% within a few decades.

While World War I left hardly any marks on Freiburg, World War II had a significant impact: After devastating attacks by the Royal Air Force on November 27, 1944, large sections of the city were reduced to ash and rubble. After 1945, reconstruction of the city centre began. Hereby, the city's medieval street structure plans, original ground plans, and facades were preserved.


Today, Freiburg is called the "Green City" thanks to its ecological commitment. With its nearly 30,000 students, Freiburg is a bustling university city and has a growing population.

ERASMUS

Language skills: a **B1-Level of German** is strongly recommended (not older than 2 years!)

Application procedure

Step 1:

To officially register you at the University of Freiburg, it is necessary for the responsible international coordinator at your home university to send a nomination for you by email to the International Office (Departmental Erasmus Coordinator: nominierung.international@jura.uni-freiburg.de) and to the Erasmus Office (Daniel Weiß, Institutional Erasmus Coordinator: erasmus@zv.uni-freiburg.de).

Step 2:

After your nomination, the Erasmus Office of Freiburg University will send you an invitation link to the online database "Mobility Online" where you need to fill in your personal information for your online application.

At the same time, we here at the "Auslandsbüro" of the Law Faculty will provide you with general information about law studies here in Freiburg.

Step 3:

For matriculation at the University, you need to submit:

- 1. Letter of acceptance (admission notice)
- 2. Valid personal ID card or passport, your resident registration, and the certificate of free movement (*Freizügigkeitsbescheinigung*)
- 3. Proof of health insurance (*Krankenversicherungsbescheinigung*)/EHIC (see below Health Insurance)
- 4. Receipt confirming payment of student fees
- Digital Application for matriculation (short-term studies)

ERASMUS Accomodation

ERASMUS students can apply for a place in a student resident hall via the Online portal Mobility Online in course of their registration. The students will receive the required link via e-mail by the ERASMUS office of the International office directly after their successful nomination by their home university.

Application deadlines for ERASMUS students

For winter semester: June 15th; for summer semester: November 30th

The rental of the room is possible from October 1st until March 31st or from April 1st until September 30th. The room must be rented for the whole period of 6 months (and rent has to be paid for the whole time period).

In recent years, most of the incoming students have been given a place in a "Wohnheim" (student resident hall). University staff members are doing their best to find accommodation for each and every incoming student. However, the housing situation in Freiburg remains tense, and the International Office recommends that, added to your application for the student resident hall, you should also look for an apartment on the private residential market (see below p. 17).

Digital Learning Agreement

Before you start your studies in Freiburg, please list the courses you have chosen in the Digital Learning Agreement, which is usually provided by your home university. The courses can be selected freely from all the offered lectures. Since the winter semester 2022/23, the approval of the Digital Learning Agreement will only be done digitally.

Application and Admittance Procedure

Step 1: Nomination

To get the process started, the coordinator from your home university has to nominate you with an email to the International Office of the Law Faculty at the Albert-Ludwigs-University in Freiburg, the email address is: nominierung.international@jura.uni-freiburg.de. Deadlines are 15th of June (for winter semester) and 15th of November (for summer semester).

Step 2: Application

Now, you have to apply at the university itself. Deadlines are **15**th **of July** (for winter semester) and **15**th **of January** (for summer semester). For that, you need to send the following documents by mail to the International Office of the Law Faculty:

- Signed Application for Admission (you can find it on our website)
- Certified copy of your Transcript of Records
- Curriculum vitae
- Certified copy of a German language certificate (B1 level)
- Certified copy of certificate of enrollment at home university
- Copy of your passport

After checking your documents, they will be sent to the **Service Center Studium – International Admissions and Services (IAS)**, which is responsible for handing out your final letter of

acceptance. When your application is accepted, it will be sent to you by email with additional information about the next steps. Also, the letter of acceptance contains your Log-In Information to HisInOne, the digital platform of the University.

Step 3: Matriculation Form

After receiving your letter of acceptance, visit:

and log in with the LogIn given in the letter of acceptance. Follow the instructions on the website and select the option "Apply for enrolment". At the end of this process, you will receive your application for matriculation form and additional information.

Step 4: Matriculation at the IAS

After your arrival in Freiburg, you need to do your matriculation in person at the **Service Center**Studium – International Admissions and Services (IAS), Sedanstraße 6, 1st floor.

Fort hat, you need to bring the following documents:

- Application for matriculation form (step 2)
- Letter of acceptance
- Evidence of health insurance coverage
- Receipt confirming payment of student union fee (103 €)
- Passport
- Valid Visa

Health insurance: For the enrolment in Freiburg, you have to be able to proof that you have a health insurance in your home country that also covers you in Germany.

A statutory health insurance company in Germany has to certify that you have insurance in your home country or you can arrange your own health insurance at a student rate with a German health insurance company.

Please be aware: The time period for the matriculation is limited, you will find the deadline on your letter of acceptance. The matriculation can be done in person or via post. Please inform yourself under: https://www.studium.uni-freiburg.de/en/student-services/matriculation or just contact the IAS directly.

LL.M.-Students

Application and Admittance

Only applicants with a degree in law which is equivalent to the first German state law examination (*Erstes Juristisches Staatsexamen*) will be accepted for postgraduate studies. Evidence of sufficient German skills must also be provided. Generally speaking, you must pass the "*Deutsche Sprachprüfung für den Hochschulzugang ausländischer Studienbewerber (DSH)*" with a grade of DSH-2 or DSH-3, or with a "*TestDAF-Zertifikat*" (minimum 4 points in each of the four areas tested).

Step 1: Firstly, you need to find a supervisor (full time professor of the Faculty of Law) to guide you, a written confirmation of your supervisor must be added to your application forms.

Step 2: Once you have found a supervisor, the next step is your online application (see also: www.jura.uni-freiburg.de/de/internationales/incomings/ll-m). Admittance deadlines are July 15th for the winter term and January 15th for the summer term. It is highly recommended to get in touch with us at least three months before the application deadline.

Step 3: Finally, in cooperation with the section International Admissions and Services (IAS), the Faculty will make the final decision concerning the admittance for the following semester. In cases of particularly high numbers of applicants, the Faculty reserves the right to accept applicants for the winter term only, meaning that admittance is only possible once a year.

Currently, admittance to the LL.M. postgraduate course of studies is possible in both the winter and summer semester.

The Faculty of Law's graduate committee finalises enrolment for the postgraduate studies after the applicant arrives in Freiburg. This decision is exclusively an act of administration and based on the decision taken by the IAS and the faculty. For this purpose, you will be fully informed at the information event.

Once you have found a supervisor, you may consult with him/her on questions and concerns that may arise. However, until that point feel free to visit us in the International Office.

Health Insurance

For the enrolment in Freiburg, you have to be able to prove that you have a health insurance in your home country that also covers you in Germany.

EU citizen only need a **EHIC** (Europe Health Insurance Card). Please inform yourself at your health insurance company in time.

After your arrival in Freiburg

- You must register at the Registration Office (Bürgerservice) of the City of Freiburg (see address below in chapter "Important addresses", p.31). Citizens of non-EU countries also have to go to the Immigration Office of the City of Freiburg (Ausländerbehörde) and apply for a residency permit.
- Please provide evidence of health insurance coverage from your home country by requesting a certificate from one of the public insurance agencies. Alternatively, you must provide evidence that a German health insurance company will insure you during your studies.
- 3. The tuition fees of 500 € as well as the social- and administrative fees of 180 € must be paid upon enrolment. You will find more information on this in the Letter of Admission that you will receive after your successful application.

Matriculation requires

- 1. Your letter of acceptance
- Valid passport with visa for study purposes (only for non-EU applicants) and/or residency permit and the resident registration at the Registration Office
- 3. Certificate providing evidence of health insurance coverage / EHIC (see above)
- 4. Payment receipt of the mentioned fees
- 5. Application for Enrolment
- 6. 2 passport photos

All documents must be submitted in person at the Service Center Studium, Department International Admissions and Services (IAS), Sedanstraße 6, 1st floor during the time periods specified in your letter of acceptance (usually mid-September to mid-October for the winter semester and mid-March to mid-April for the summer semester).

At the beginning of your study time, you will need to request admission at the Faculty of Law directly as well (Werthmannstr. 4, 4th floor). For this additional administrative step, you will need the documents listed above as well.

It is not necessary to apply for the attendance of lectures or exams before the start of the semester. We recommend you to inform yourself about the offered lectures.

Private residential market

Since not all applicants can be allocated a room in a student dorm, the International Office recommends that you look for accommodation on the private housing market at the same time as you apply for a place in a student dormitory, and that you also search for a room outside of Freiburg. Many surrounding communities such as Gundelfingen, Denzlingen, Schallstadt and Bad Krozingen have very good local transport connections (between 5 and 20 minutes from Freiburg).

Please complete the online application on the SLI – website well in advance as courses may be fully booked rather quickly.

Since the dormitory rooms for Erasmus exchange students are not available until **October 1**st, we recommend that you request a room from SLI for the duration of the language course.

Courses during the teaching period:

During the semester, SLI invites Erasmus and faculty exchange students to attend free language and regional studies courses.

<u>Important:</u> Participants must possess **A2 level** language skills according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages in order to attend these courses.

Those who do not possess this language level will not be allowed to participate in these courses. In those cases, the student may attend SLI courses that are subject to fees.

Online registration is required for all courses.

Online registration is normally possible on the SLI homepage from **mid-September to mid-October** for the winter semester and from **mid-March to mid-April** for the summer semester. Please apply as soon as possible. Applicants will be selected first come first serve. Course Catalogue

The course catalogue will be published two months before the start of each semester. To start planning your lectures beforehand (for Erasmus Learning Agreement) please use the course catalogues of the past years for your orientation. You can find the course catalogue by scanning the QR-code.



One hour of lectures takes 45 minutes, they therefore normally start 15 minutes after the stated time ($cum\ tempore = c.t.$) and lectures of two hours end 15 minutes earlier than stated. In case a lecture starts on the hour, you will find the statement $sine\ tempore\ (s.t.)$.

Types of Courses

<u>Lecture</u>: In a lecture, the lecturer presents the content. Generally speaking, students do not actively participate, although lecturers may at times call for participation. Note of regular student attendance can be taken.

Seminar. (suitable for LL.M. students): The aim of the seminars is to perform a deeper analysis of details and problems in particular areas of legal theory and thus involves considerable independent research. Every participant is given a specific subject to work on. The final grade will be based on a 20-30 page term paper and an oral presentation on the same topic, followed by a discussion.

<u>"WuV-Kurse"+ "Übungen"</u>: are not suitable for international students

ECTS-Credits (ERASMUS, Faculty Exchange Program, Free Mover)

The ECTS list will be sent to you by e-mail after your successful nomination.

ECTS Credits (LL.M. Students)

The examination regulations for LL.M. students specify not to use an evaluation with ECTS-points, but with semester hours per week (=SWS). A course of two hours per week provides two contact hours/SWS

Exams

Exams usually take place at the end of each semester or in the very first week of the semester break. Whether students are required to take the exam in oral or written form, solve a case or answer questions on material dealt with in the seminar is at the professor's discretion. Please enquire about exam dates at the very beginning of the semester.

At our **Information event** you will be provided with valuable Information regarding achieving your ECTS- Credits and study achievements.

issuance of the Transcript of Records is the responsibility of the Examination Office of the Faculty of Law.

Start of studies

centre stop at "Stadttheater"

take a shuttle bus to Freiburg. This ride takes about 1 hour.

By car: Freiburg is close to the A 5 highway and is easy to get to from Basel,

Straßburg or Karlsruhe; take the "Freiburg Mitte" exit

Transportation in Freiburg

Freiburg is a "bicycle city". To get around in Freiburg it is usually faster and easier to go by bike than by car. You can buy cheap bicycles at auctions organized by the city of Freiburg or at one of the many bike shops.

Public transport in Freiburg is also very good. For longer distances within the city you may take the Tram run by the VAG (*Verkehrsbetriebe Freiburg*) and/or the bus for longer ones. Tickets may be purchased either directly at machines located in trams and buses, or at *VAG-Pluspunkt*

(Infopoint) located on "Salzstraße". Payment of your semester fees also automatically entitles you to purchase the reduced "Semesterticket" for 96 € (also available online). For more information, please visit www.vag-freiburg.de.

You may use public transport in Freiburg for free after 7.00 p.m. if you carry your UniCard, a valid photo ID and the "19 o'clock proof" ("19 Uhr-Nachweis").

University Library or "UB"

The university library (Universitätsbibliothek), or UB for short (see area map), is the largest scientific library in the region. The UB holds over 3.5 million books and provides students with extensive access to online and electronic media. The UB offers a wide variety of learning and research materials. Some of them can also be borrowed.

To borrow books from the library or use the copy machines at the University, you will need your "UniCard" (see below), it is also your library card.

The Juridicum (Library of the Law Department)

The department library (Seminarbibliothek) of the Faculty of Law was founded in 1889 and currently holds over 250,000 volumes and around 700 journals. It is strictly a reference library, meaning the books may not be borrowed. Because of the construction work of the KG II, the department library is also located in the UB for some time.

PC workstations

The UB offers PC workstations at several locations. PCs are equipped with the regular windows applications and have internet access. You also have the possibility to use the "PC-Pool" located at Werthmannstr. 4.

You must sign in for using the available PCs. For that, you require a valid account from the computer centre or *Rechenzentrum* (RZ). The Service Center Studium will automatically send you the account number via email after your matriculation at the University is completed.

UniCard

After your matriculation you will automatically receive the UniCard, which has several functions: It serves as your student identification card, library card and copy and cafeteria card. You may use your EC card to put money on the UniCard. This can be done at machines located in the cafeteria (Mensa), in the UB and in KG III (ground floor next to the university's post office). If you wish to top up your card using cash this may be done at any of the university cafés or cafeterias. You can also use your UniCard in combination with a valid photo ID and the "19 o'clock proof" ("19 Uhr-Nachweis") as a ticket for free public transport in Freiburg after 7.00 p.m.

Student Council (Fachschaft)

It is the Fachschaft's responsibility to represent the interests of law students at faculty level to the best of their ability. Thus, every summer semester five law students are elected into the so-called faculty council (a committee consisting of professors, academic personnel, and students) to assist in making decisions which affect the entire faculty. Tourist Information

Freiburg is surrounded by a variety of different landscapes that are among the most beautiful in Germany. To the west, the Kaiserstuhl, which is famous for its excellent wines and fruits, unfolds. It is also one of the most popular areas to go hiking and to visit one of the many "Strauße" (small family-owned restaurants or cafés which open only seasonally). Between the Kaiserstuhl and Alsace, France, Breisach is one of the oldest and most significant cities in the Breisgau area and definitely worth a visit.

To the south the Breisgau joins up with the Markgräflerland. Here one is lured by beautiful villages such as Staufen and Sulzburg and mesmerized by the picturesque ambience of castles and vineyards.

It should also be noted that Freiburg lies at the foot of the Black Forest, the highest low-mountain range in Germany. Numerous recreational and leisure activities such as hiking, climbing, mountain biking or skiing, make the Black Forest a very popular destination. The efficient public transport system also makes access to these activities quick and easy.

There are also plenty of field trips destinations in Freiburg's immediate surroundings. For example, Freiburg's landmark mountain: the Schauinsland. To explore the Schauinsland, take the cable car (Schauinslandbahn) up the mountain and visit the "Museums-Bergwerk Schauinsland", a former mine that has been converted into a tourist attraction.

Freiburg lies in what is known as the "Dreiländereck", or the three-corner country, where Germany, France and Switzerland meet. Freiburg's location thus makes trips to Alsace or northern Switzerland an ideal way to spend a day. Alsace draws tourists in with its charming little

towns, fine wines and cheeses and cultural treasures such as the Isenheimer altar in Colmar. Basel is an especially beautiful city located at Freiburg's doorstep. The city entices tourists with culture and the charm of Swiss composure. However, be aware Switzerland can be expensive!

Coming to an end: Those of you who wish to see something other than the University and Freiburg at the weekend will be spoilt for choice!
